SPOTLIGHT ON SCIENCE

Birchwood's A Level and GCSE Science students had the opportunity to attend inspiring Science Live events in London, where they listened to leading scientists across a range of disciplines. The events featured engaging lectures on cutting-edge topics such as coral reef restoration, forensic anthropology, mental health, nanotechnology, and particle physics. Highlights included insights into growing vegetables on discarded mattresses in Syrian refugee camps, the science of laughter and vocalisations, and ethical dilemmas in human reproduction research. Students also explored advancements in neuroscience, marine biodiversity, and genetics.

These events provided students with a fascinating glimpse into the real-world applications of science, supported by examiner-led sessions on improving exam technique. From examining whether we are made of stardust to witnessing innovations such as nanotech clothing, the experiences were both educational and inspiring, fostering curiosity and ambition among Birchwood's aspiring scientists.




GSK WORKSHOPS FOR STUDENTS


Chemistry Week celebrations began with an exciting visit from GSK staff, who ran a hands-on workshop for students. The workshop focused on how scientists determine which coatings to use on tablets to control how quickly different medications dissolve in the stomach. By choosing different coating substances, they can adjust the rate at which a tablet dissolves.

To explore this concept, students used lemonade to replicate the acidic environment of the stomach and coated Smarties with various substances, including jam, honey, mayonnaise, deodorant, and hairspray. They then dropped the coated Smarties into lemonade and timed how long it took for each coating to dissolve, giving them a fascinating insight into the science of tablet design.


ADVERTISING UNLOCKED

SPOTLIGHT ON FOOD TECHNOLOGY by Josh Beasley

This term Josh has been making apple crumble in Food Technology and wanted to share his recipe. It will make the perfect pudding for cold December evenings.

APPLE CRUMBLE

50g butter or margarine 100g plain flour 50g oats 25g sugar 2 eating apples (eg Braeburn) 50g sultanas

Method

I. Peel the apples then cut the apples into quarters and remove the core, Slice the apples thinly.

2. Place apples in a saucepan and cover with 100ml water, cook on a low heat until semi soft.

3. Meanwhile, rub the butter or margarine into the flour until it looks like breadcrumbs. 4. Stir the oats and sugar into the crumble.

5. Place the semi soft apples into the bottom of the dish

6. Sprinkle the sultanas over the top of the apples and then the crumble to cover the fruit

7. Bake for 20 mins until the apple is soft and the crumble is golden brown.

I recommend you make this. It is yummy! I am going to make this again!







WHY WE CELEBRATE REMBEMBERANCE DAY

So, in 1914 there was this really complicated thing called WWI. It was brutal with conditions in the trenches being disgusting! The Western front saw the most brutal fighting of the war and many men died there. In fact the deadliest day in British military history was I July 1916 at the Battle of the Somme where the Germans inflicted 57,000 deaths on the British. The war also saw many fatalities on the French side with 400,000 casualties at the Battle of Verdun.

After an 100 days offensive into France in early 1918 failed, Germany knew the war was over and began preparations for a peace deal. On the 29 September 1918, Bulgaria, a German ally, surrendered. This was shortly followed by the Ottoman empire on 30 October and Austria on 3 November.

On the 6 November knowing the war was lost Prince Maximilian of Baden instructed the German Foreign secretary, to go to France and gain mercy for the Germans and "For God's sake bring peace". On 7 November at 10 o'clock Erzberger arrived in France. Diplomats agreed terms of peace, Erzberger signed the armistice and with that the slaughter of millions was finally over.

It was agreed the Armistice would take place on 11 November at 11 o'clock. 11 hour of the 11 day of the 11 month!


After the armistice came, the battlefields were abandoned and poppies started to grow. This is why poppies are used for Remembrance Day.

We use this day to remember everyone who fought for our nation in all wars, not just WWI.


